

The meeting which took place at Uwezo offices in Kamwokya was presided over by the Board Chair, Prof Albert James Lutalo-Bosa (Vice Chancellor, Team University) and attended by all other Board members, including Dr Charles Tony Mukasa-Lusambu (Assistant Commissioner of Basic Education, Ministry of Education and Sports); Mr James Muwonge (Director, Socio economic Surveys, Uganda Bureau of Statistics); Prof Joyce Ayikoru Asiimwe (Dean, Faculty of Education, Kyambogo University) and Dr Sarah Ssewanyana (Executive Director, Economic Policy Research Centre). Also in attendance at the inaugural meeting was Advocate Kizito Ssekitooleko (Company Secretary) and Dr Mary Goretti Nakabugo (Executive Director and Board Secretary).

The Board approved Uwezo Uganda 2020-23 strategy and the 2020 annual plan. It also constituted two Board Committees (Finance and Audit Committee and Partnerships and Resource Mobilisation Committee) and approved a request from the Secretariat to constitute a Technical Advisor Committee (TAC) to advise on program work.

The two Board committees held their

inaugural meetings on 16th and 23rd June respectively.



NEWS FROM UWEZO UGANDA DISTRICT PARTNERS!

Right from its inception as a program of Twaweza in 2010, Uwezo Uganda has been implementing its learning assessments and communication programmes in collaboration with district-based Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) in Uganda. In this issue, we profile two of our partner organisations to share the impressive work they have been doing in their districts in response to Covid-19.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND CHILD WELFARE INITIATIVES (CODI), Luwero District



CODI's Response to Education of children during Covid 19

In response to the unprecedented pandemic Covid -19, the Ministry of Education and Sports under the guidance of the National Curriculum Development Centre (NCDC) formulated a framework to provide standardised study lesson packages in core subjects for primary and secondary levels for distribution to all learners. The focus in the short term was to provide remedial lessons targeting topics that could have been covered by learners while at school.

For the medium and long term strategy, the Ministry would develop lessons for the proceeding terms. The framework emphasises an inclusive and equitable approach for all learners irrespective of their social and economic status, geographical location or disability status. However, the pandemic situation being a new experience for most stakeholders, it wasn't to be minus challenges. It turns out that the learning materials distributed were inadequate, requiring some parents to reproduce copies for their children. Many parents were constrained by lack of money to photocopy materials for their children. Most parents were economically affected by Covid 19 thus having no option but to abandon the whole exercise. The few parents that endeavored to reproduce copies of materials for their children were constrained by closure of stationery shops with secretarial services because of the lockdown. Besides, majority of the parents did not have capacity to guide their children on the lessons obtained from the Ministry due to literacy gaps. So most children were left to work on their own as the parents or guardians didn't have the requisite knowledge on the work sent to their children.

Community Development and Child Welfare Initiatives (CODI), which is a child focused non-governmental organisation operating in Luwero district, undertook to help a few parents to reproduce the materials using the office equipment. Given the low capacity amongst the parents to give guidance to the learners, one of the CODI staff with a teaching background and exposed to Teaching at the Right Level (TaRL) courtesy of Uwezo support, supported a few households following the Ministry of Health guidelines to help learners.

GIVING CHILDREN HOPE INITIATIVE (GCHI) – MITYANA DISTRICT COVID 19 LOCKDOWN CHILDREN'S LEARNING INTERVENTIONS



Empower | Mentor | Inspire

During this COVID 19 Lockdown, Giving Children Hope Initiative has carried out and continues to carry out child protection interventions and creating possible children's learning environment in line with the Ministry of Health guidelines in the fight against the spread of corona virus. Most of these interventions are embracing the use of digital and online platforms to continue engaging children in learning while fronting children's mentoring model of emphasising parents, guardians and caregivers to nurture the children's 5Cs skills; Creativity, Curiosity, Collaboration, Critical thinking and Communication.



At the start of the lockdown in mid – March. when all schools were closed including the GCHI founded school called Hope Children's School in Mityana, we knew it from day one that what children needed most during these times of uncertainty, was psychosocial support to help them understand the prevailing circumstances of the day, and boost their mental health. Children would also require support with their lessons especially the primary seven and primary six pupils. As such, by using our GCHI community program contacts, we have been making routine phones calls to parents making follow ups on the children's learning progress and to understand how our children are acclimatising to the new normal but also to offer guidance on top of providing mentorship. Parents who own smart phones have had an extra benefit because we have routinely shared learning aids and held discussions via the WhatsApp platform.

As of 16-6-2020 we had reached out to over 90 parents and caregivers via phone calls where we have interacted with over 130 school going children in the age bracket of 9 – 17 years in Mityana, Mubende and Kampala.

HIGHLIGHTS OF UWEZO UGANDA PROGRAM WORK FROM JANUARY-JUNE 2020

Finalisation of the 2019 Young People Assessment report



We finalised a report of the 2019 pilot assessment of young people's literacy and numeracy competencies required in the workplace and everyday life. The assessment was conducted in collaboration with Oxford Policy Management Limited (OPML) under the Strengthening Education Systems for Improved Learning (SESIL) programme supported by the UK's Department for International Development (DFID) and Ministry of Education and Sports (MoES). The pilot report will be officially launched in July 2020 ahead of the planned scaled up assessment in four districts of Uganda. Many of the organizations in our community use information, often in the form of detailed leai outcomes data, to create change in education systems. Such information can play at least the roles: a) reveal the nature and dynamics of the learning crisis; b) enable teachers and school administrators to improve outcomes, c) genorate political pressure at local and national lovel change. Information about learning outcomes does not spur change all on its own. To instiga systemic shift information needs to be coupled with strategies for engaging a range of staket including citizens, researchers, and governments and spuring action.


